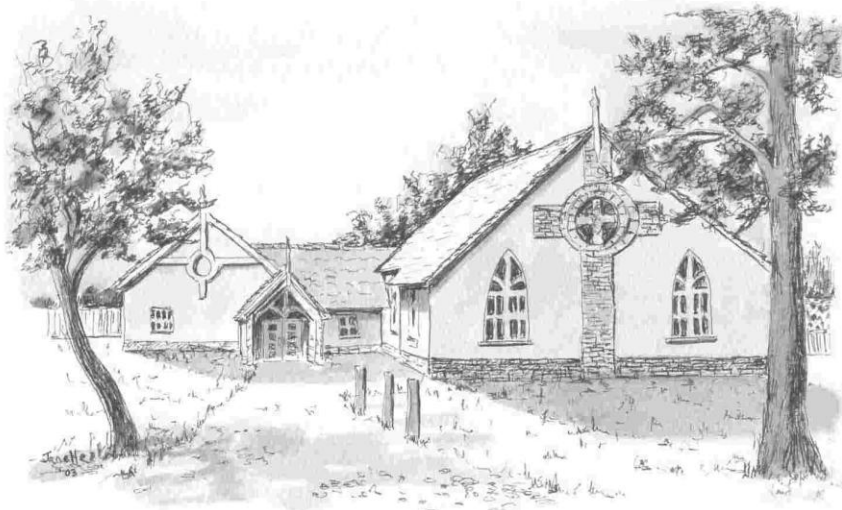

The Parish of Sonning

The ancient parish of Sonning, originally extending from Sonning Common to Sandhurst was one of the great blocks of land handed over to the Church in the 7th century. In 909 A.D. Sonning with Ramsbury, became a separate bishopric, the Bishop of Ramsbury/ Sonning maintaining a riverside Hall in the village. In 1075 the see was transferred to Old Sarum, ultimately Salisbury, whose bishops had their own Palace on the same site as the Saxon Hall until 1574, when the manor was transferred to the Crown.

St Andrew's Church in the heart of the village was founded in Saxon times - probably by Birinus, first bishop of Dorchester-on-Thames. It was largely rebuilt in 1852, during the incumbency of Canon Hugh Pearson; it was he who founded the Sonning Parish Magazine in 1869.

The White Hart Hotel, now known as The Great House, and partly 17th century, stands on the site of older buildings including the home of 'Elias the Ferryman' mentioned in a deed of 1100. The French Horn Hotel, in Sonning Eye, was built in the 1880s in front of the original old inn - now Bridge House - and its farm buildings. The Bull Inn, belonging to the Church, was originally known as Church House, a guesthouse for pilgrims to medieval St Sarik's Chapel in St Andrew's. Also adjoining the church is Deanery Garden one of Sir Edwin Lutyen's best-known country houses built at the turn of the century, just above the site of the ancient residence of the Deans of Salisbury who regularly visited Sonning, the parish being a 'Dean's Peculiar'.

Sonning Mill produced a regular supply of flour from Saxon time until 1969, after which it was converted into a 'Dinner Theatre', the first of its kind in Britain. The Pearson Hall is the principal venue for village functions

Within the village boundaries lie the Reading Blue Coat School at Holme Park (once the home of the Lord of the Manor) Sonning Church of England Primary School, King George's Field and other sports grounds, and Reading University Farm - all of which help to preserve the rural atmosphere of Sonning, the centre of which is now a conservation area.

The civil parish of Charvil is of relatively recent origin but the land on which it lies has long been part of the ecclesiastical parish of Sonning. In the 18th and 19th centuries it consisted of Charville Farm and a few cottages, which lay between the villages of Sonning and Twyford and adjacent to the London to Bath highway.

The development of Charvil began between the two World Wars, particularly after the new A4 road was constructed in the 1920s bypassing Twyford, and was accelerated after 1945. To meet the needs of this increasingly large community, St Patrick's dual-purpose Church and Hall was consecrated and

opened in 1952; it remains within the ecclesiastical parish of Sonning. It was considerably extended and refurbished in 2001.

The Vicars Letter

Dear friends,

Advent is upon us, and along with purple vestments, calendars, candles and the expectation of the Saviour's birth, these days it is usually accompanied by reports in the media that you couldn't really make up. Recent treats have been the banning of the term 'Christmas' lights by Lambeth council, the use of the term 'Winterville' in Birmingham and the council funded charity 'Oxford Inspires' adopting a 'winter lights festival' in place of Christmas. The wise men (sorry, persons) from Lambeth council feel that the usual display of bright festive lights that, in the minds of us reactionary, simple folk are to celebrate Christmas, are it is felt, offensive to certain sections of society, and therefore the decree has gone forth that they are now to be called 'Winter lights.' I even read yesterday of a council banning the phrase "singing from the same hymn sheet", for fear of offending atheists. One can just imagine reports in regional papers of Nativity plays being cancelled in schools because of racial or religious sensitivities, and

replaced by pantomimes, and insipid drivel about snow men and elves, which, whilst entertaining for proud parents, are hardly an adequate replacement. Of course, Snow White and her seven ‘little helpers’ as we should now refer to them, would no doubt be grateful for the extra work. Maybe we should even consider re naming the panto star Snow Grey, for fear of being racially exclusive, but then that might be offensive to an aging population. I jest of course, but am I that far from reality?

I have to admit to finding all this amusing, but then I suppose I should also be slightly alarmed that such nonsense is actually peddled, and more importantly, acted upon. Followers of other religions are proud of their festivals, and rightly so. Some of them are marked in schools, and much care is given to respecting sensitivities. All of which is the mark of a mature and decent society and we should welcome that. Those who are offended by the Christmas story have something in common with one of its characters. King Herod seemed to be rather offended by the message of Christmas, although I’m not sure that even the most ardent secularist would want to be associated with his unique contribution.

There is much that is ridiculous about what Xmas (to use the favoured abbreviation) has become. As we prepare through Advent to celebrate the life changing and hope restoring arrival of the Saviour of the world at Christmas, let us be bold and unashamed to do as the hymn writer tells us. “Tell of his birth at Bethlehem, not in a royal house or hall, but in a stable dark and dim, the word made flesh, a light for all”. May His light shine brightly within us all this Christmastide.

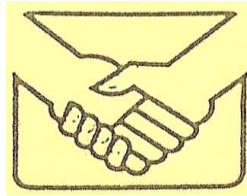

Our volunteer drivers are only asked to help as and when they are able and are paid 40p per mile.

Ideally, we would like to develop an extensive list of potential drivers so that we can share the responsibility and call on individual volunteers as little as possible. The Pearson Hall was packed for the Society's 5th Annual General Meeting held on 15 November. A short business meeting and an excellent supper were rounded off by Sally Hughes, Managing Director of The Mill, explaining how her parents Tim & Eileen Richards came, purely by chance, to be involved in The Mill.

In many ways The Mill might be seen to be symbolic of the Society's aims and objectives. Historically important to the life of the both Sonning and Sonning Eye, The Mill is recorded in the Domesday Book (1085). It milled flour for some 900 years, until mass production further down the river and Canadian imports spelled its end (1969). In 2008 as a shining example of enlightened conservation, The Mill celebrated the 25th anniversary of its successful conversion to an unsubsidised dinner theatre venue (1982), attracting acclaimed directors and actors to work there. Since 2005, The Mill has been environmentally sound and very green through the fulfilment of Tim's dream of generating electricity by harnessing the river's power. It contributes to the National Grid during the day, while drawing half its needs from the grid when the 'the curtain goes up'.

There are a few changes at the top on the Executive Committee for 2008/09. Bob Hine and Brian O'Callaghan were unanimously elected as Chair and Vice-Chair respectively. Annabella Marks now represents Sonning Eye, while Pam Byrne, a Sonning Parish Councillor, has been elected to formally represent the Council. Those present at the AGM were delighted to approve the nomination of Canon Chris Clarke as Honorary Vice-President, while John Edmonds, after fulfilling the role of interim Chairman, now resumes his presidential role 'full-time'.

The Society maintains a constant membership in excess of 200. It always welcomes new members, and particularly those who would like to contribute actively to its four panels (Planning & Environment, Traffic &

Transport, Education and the Social Committee). Members who joined before September 2008 are gently reminded that annual subscriptions fall due on 1 January - renewal forms will be circulated with the next issue of *Bridge*.

Keep on Collecting

On Tuesday, 28th October 2008, again, like last year I visited the HQ of *Hearing Dogs for Deaf People*, based at Saunderton to deliver a total of 11kgs of used postage stamps. The 11kgs was made up of 8kgs of low value definitives, 1.6kgs of low value commemoratives 0.85kgs of foreign and 0.55kgs of high value definitives. These represent 15 months collecting and sorting, the extra 3 months were to allow me to fill the 8kg box.

I was also able to give to *Hearing Dogs for the Deaf* a £5.00 donation from the sale of a single stamp, plus what it was attached to. It was a late Victorian 1p mauve on a receipt from *E. Jackson*, dated 22nd April 1892; 116 years old and in good condition. One day it occurred to me that it might be the *Jackson* of *Jackson's Corner* in Reading. Next time in Reading I went in to ask and sure enough, it was and the manager gave me £5.00 for it, for their archives and memorabilia department. A very special "Thank you" from HD for DP to the person who didn't tear the stamp off its backing.

Talking of which, as neither I nor HD for DP remove the stamps from the paper they are attached to, please leave plenty of paper around the stamp if you can. This allows me to trim and leave a 1cm margin on as many sides of the stamp as possible. The unwelcome notice on top of the stamp box in the church porch was prompted by the large number of torn and excessively trimmed stamps in a large box of stamps. Since receiving a similar box I now know that they do not originate from Sonning. As there were a lot of good stamps as well, I must be grateful for that and leave it, but a damaged stamp is only paper for recycling.

Thank you, and please keep the stamps coming in so that we receive an even bigger "Thank you" next year. We did better than last year, so here's to next year, but I can't do it without your help.

As many people are already aware, I and an incredibly hard working small team of volunteers have been working on the Society's project to record the memories of Sonning and Sonning Eye residents. We are fortunate in having a wealth of information about our village available to us now which could be irretrievably lost as memories fade.

We are very grateful to those who have let us record their memories and we have now made and professionally archived nearly sixty interviews. The exhibition will be held from 11 to 13 September 2009 in the Pearson Hall, Sonning and we have been fortunate that the Museum of English Rural Life will then take it for a further three months from January to March 2010. Our archived material will also be available to schools (in particular our two local schools which we have consulted to ensure our proposed format best meets their requirements) and to the general public as a research source. We hope we will then be able to take our project a stage further and produce a book from our research.

The exhibition will focus on ten themes such as homes, schooling, local shops and recreation facilities, Sonning during the War, the Mill and the river, as remembered by the people who have lived here. Each theme will have an explanatory display banner and recordings of memories with supporting photographs, documents and artefacts. We also plan to make a DVD of the village. To do this properly and professionally, we need to raise money to cover the cost of all the display materials - our ten banners, for example, will cost around £100 each and we estimate the total cost of the exhibitions will be in the region of £3,400. We are therefore asking local residents and organisations to help us, either by buying a piece of equipment which you would loan us for the exhibitions (eg a laptop, touch screen or screen and mouse, or a free standing banner which you can redesign and use afterwards) or by a direct donation (cheques payable please to the Society) or by offers of practical skills. If you are able to help us in some way, we will be extremely grateful and very happy to add your name to our list of donors and give you advertising space in our guide.

Our project will provide a lasting and valuable record of life in Sonning and Sonning Eye and we would be very grateful for your help in achieving this.

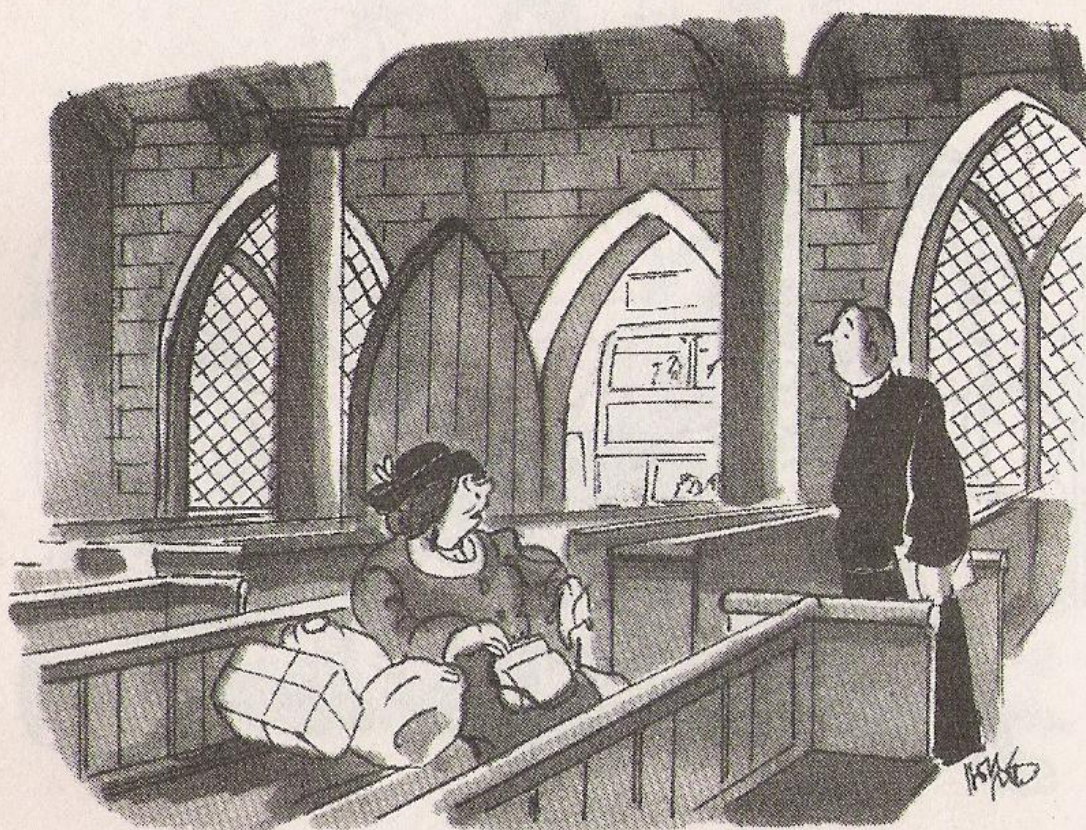
