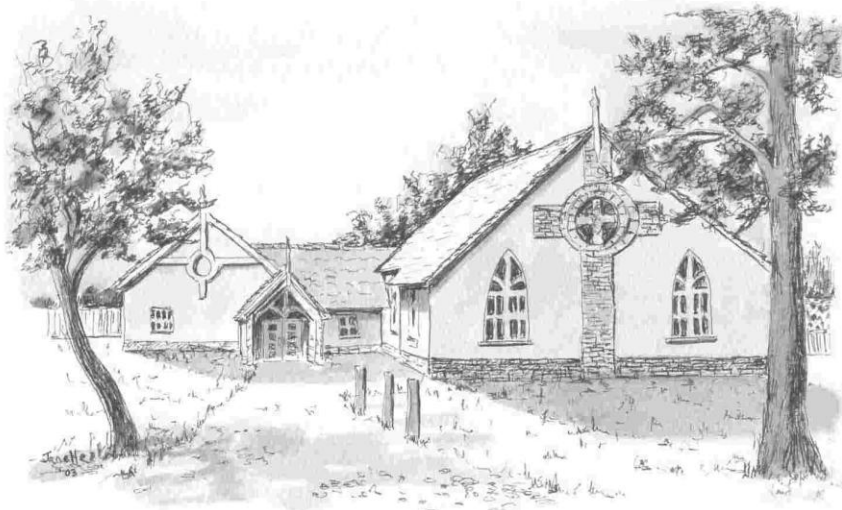

## The Parish of Sonning

The ancient parish of Sonning, originally extending from Sonning Common to Sandhurst was one of the great blocks of land handed over to the Church in the 7th century. In 909 A.D. Sonning with Ramsbury, became a separate bishopric, the Bishop of Ramsbury/ Sonning maintaining a riverside Hall in the village. In 1075 the see was transferred to Old Sarum, ultimately Salisbury, whose bishops had their own Palace on the same site as the Saxon Hall until 1574, when the manor was transferred to the Crown.

St Andrew's Church in the heart of the village was founded in Saxon times - probably by Birinus, first bishop of Dorchester-on-Thames. It was largely rebuilt in 1852, during the incumbency of Canon Hugh Pearson; it was he who founded the Sonning Parish Magazine in 1869.

The White Hart Hotel, now known as The Great House, and partly 17th century, stands on the site of older buildings including the home of 'Elias the Ferryman' mentioned in a deed of 1100. The French Horn Hotel, in Sonning Eye, was built in the 1880s in front of the original old inn - now Bridge House - and its farm buildings. The Bull Inn, belonging to the Church, was originally known as Church House, a guesthouse for pilgrims to medieval St Sarik's Chapel in St Andrew's. Also adjoining the church is Deanery Garden one of Sir Edwin Lutyen's best-known country houses built at the turn of the century, just above the site of the ancient residence of the Deans of Salisbury who regularly visited Sonning, the parish being a 'Dean's Peculiar'.

Sonning Mill produced a regular supply of flour from Saxon time until 1969, after which it was converted into a 'Dinner Theatre', the first of its kind in Britain. The Pearson Hall is the principal venue for village functions

Within the village boundaries lie the Reading Blue Coat School at Holme Park (once the home of the Lord of the Manor) Sonning Church of England Primary School, King George's Field and other sports grounds, and Reading University Farm - all of which help to preserve the rural atmosphere of Sonning, the centre of which is now a conservation area.

The civil parish of Charvil is of relatively recent origin but the land on which it lies has long been part of the ecclesiastical parish of Sonning. In the 18th and 19th centuries it consisted of Charville Farm and a few cottages, which lay between the villages of Sonning and Twyford and adjacent to the London to Bath highway.

The development of Charvil began between the two World Wars, particularly after the new A4 road was constructed in the 1920s bypassing Twyford, and was accelerated after 1945. To meet the needs of this increasingly large community, St Patrick's dual-purpose Church and Hall was consecrated and opened in 1952; it remains within the ecclesiastical parish of Sonning. It was considerably extended and refurbished in 2001.

### The Vicars Letter

Dear friends,

"There probably is no God". I never thought I'd start a letter with those words. This is the slogan that is emblazoned on 800 buses in our capital, paid for by militant secularists. I suspect that heaven's foundations have yet to quiver over this latest move to sideline the Almighty, but I do suspect that, if humour exists on high, then a good laugh is being had by all. What facile nonsense this is, and, in my view, counter-productive to the atheist's cause, with the word 'probably' undermining the thrust of their argument. What better way to get people to evaluate the place of God in the world and in their lives than by reminding them in this way? Some Christian groups have tried to get these pitiful advertisements banned on the grounds of them being offensive, and, needless to say, they have failed. I can't say that I am particularly offended, believing that the Lord of the Universe can probably cope with such school boy graffiti, but one does wonder what would have happened if, in place of 'God', the target was Allah, or a god from any other religion. I suppose Christianity is something of a soft target however.

We could be forgiven for thinking that we live in a society where everyone has a right to be offended, except law abiding Christians. The media is filled with accounts of this group or another being offended at a chance remark that is deemed 'inappropriate'; the catch all new denunciation of anyone who says anything out of line. I was fascinated to read of the fuss surrounding Jeremy Clarkson's recent unflattering description of the Prime Minister. The BBC swiftly procured an apology from him, not because of a deluge of protest over the fact that he had insulted the Queen's first Minister, but because disabled groups had been 'offended' at the reference to him being partially sighted. Many Christians are regularly 'offended' by output from the BBC, not least from one Mr J Ross, but then again we don't really seem to register on their radar.

I can't really get too worked up about this, preferring to take the long view, secure in a faith that has endured much worse than this. Our preparations for Easter have begun, and we once again spend time in the wilderness with our Lord as he faces the trial and humiliation of the cross. Many were 'offended' by his ministry; by his simple yet powerful message of love and forgiveness. He caused huge 'offence' to the ruling elites, and they conspired to deal with him once and for all, or so they thought. His example is one for us all to follow, in our own small way. If we are true to His message, we will also give 'offence' to the world, for God's ways are not the world's. There is so much that is wrong and broken about our society, and Christians have a responsibility to stand up and do something about that. My prayer for all of us is that we will never shy away from proclaiming that which is decent and true in God's sight, for fear of offending anyone.

A verse of one of my favourite hymns says it all: 'Stand up, stand up for Jesus, give courage to the weak, be unashamed to praise Him, be bold His name to speak. Confront the cross unflinching, Christ's love has set us free; he conquered death for ever and lives eternally'.

## Charvil From Afar

When you look down the wrong end of a telescope everything looks small and a long way away. So it is as I put pen to paper surrounded as we are totally by Chinese people in vast numbers, where few if any speak English and by the heritage of modern Chinese culture. Western domestic & commercial architecture retail influence is in significant evidence vis. KFC and McDonald's to mention but two. However it also gives a superb

opportunity to concentrate on the family without any distractions on the one hand and internal silence and reflection on the other.

Firstly the two weeks away have provided an excellent window of space to catch up on one's reading - principally Bishop Stephen's most recent publication "Do nothing to change your life." This is a most valuable contribution to one's comprehension of 'God's is love' in terms of creativity and community. If you haven't already read it, it is a must for Lent.

Secondly space for reading is not the only space provided by being away from normal hustle and bustle of daily life for the two weeks. There has been the experience of breathing space - space to make good use of the prayer of silence "peace be still", providing the chance to breathe in and out with each word in sequence. It is the silence of eternity which draws you closer to God and to the ones you love.

Thirdly there has been the increased necessity for environmental space which the city takes away through everyone living on top of one another. Beijing is no exception, where the majority live in high rise skyscrapers, cheek by jowl, consisting of small flats. So it was with great relief on a visit to the 2008 Olympic site to discover how spatially laid out it was in the vicinity of the "birds' nest" stadium. This showed great foresight on the part of those who designed & planned the site initially. Breathtaking views from high upon the Great Wall emphasized the need we all have for environmental space to appreciate the width, the height and the depth of heavenly space.

This Lent may we encourage everyone to make and experience God-given space in body, mind and spirit, where and when we can come up for spiritual and physical fresh air.

## The History of the Sonning Volunteer Fire Brigade

With the fire station standing empty and awaiting demolition, now is perhaps a good time to look back at the history of the *Sonning Volunteer Fire Brigade* and reflect on the considerable impact it has had, not just on life in the village, but on the national Fire Service as a whole.

With the earliest evidence of organised fire fighting in the UK being discovered locally at the Roman settlement in Silchester you may think that Sonning was a little tardy in not organising its own village fire brigade until 1905. On July 18th, following a public meeting in Pearson Hall, the villagers realising the shortcomings in their preparedness for fighting fires finally proceeded to equip themselves with a standpipe and two lengths of canvas hose at the grand cost of £4.17s.6d. (£4.87<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>p in today's money).

They were not so slow in 1937 however when Sonning Fire Brigade became the first Brigade in the country to have an enclosed cab fire appliance. Designed by the Chief Fire Officer Tom Edwards and based on a Dennis Ace chassis the cab was built by Markham's of Reading. Sonning received many congratulations from other brigades on obtaining such a magnificent machine. During World War II this appliance saw a great deal of action attending fires following air raids on London docks, Birmingham, Southampton, Bristol, Ascot, Oxford and Plymouth.

Without the benefits of modern day protective clothing, breathing apparatus and high pressure pumps, brave men from the village successfully fought many a fierce conflagration putting their own lives in danger to save the lives and property of others.

## Sonning & Sonning Eye Society

Well, the thought that The Bull might actually be the site of a Saxon Church, precursor to St Andrew's, was just one revelation offered by Kev Beachus, former County Archaeologist, at the Blue Coat School in January. Kev first spoke in St Andrew's five years ago about the value of the 2001 discovery of skeletons when The Bull landscaped the patio area behind the kitchens. This time Kev confirmed that the disturbed skeletons were indeed Saxon, and raised tantalisingly, the idea that they were buried in a Saxon cemetery.

Sadly the archaeological watching brief that WDC was supposed to have over the construction works was 'overlooked' and several skeletons ended up ignominiously in a landfill site (as have others since!). Fortunately 30+ skeletons escaped this fate: 16 have been positively identified as male, 7 were female and a further 7 were unidentifiable (likely to be male). They date from the period 950-1050 A.D. Their ages ranged from under 25 to over 46, although none were over 60. The average height was 5' 6" tall by our expectations, although there was one 'giant' who was over 6' tall. They appear to have been well fed, with strong muscles. Some had bone problems, and only two had teeth.

St Andrew's, if one accepts its Norman origins (the nave and tower are the oldest parts), is 'too far away' from this Saxon cemetery, which would have been located close to its church. A church in Sonning is recorded as an endowment of Salisbury Cathedral in 1091. With the establishment in 1220 of a perpetual vicar by the Bishop of Salisbury, was a decision taken to enlarge the Norman church as befitted the status of the vicar under such patronage? At the same time was it decided to convert the Saxon church into the hospice for visitors to the Bishop when in residence? The lively discussion after the talk included valuable insights into the topography of Sonning. For instance it is clear that what is now Sonning Lane once continued down towards the bridge, with the Saxon church to the east, and the later Norman church to the west - a route much used by walkers today. What a lot of food for thought!

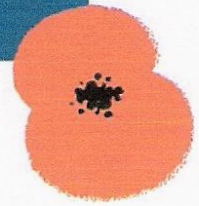

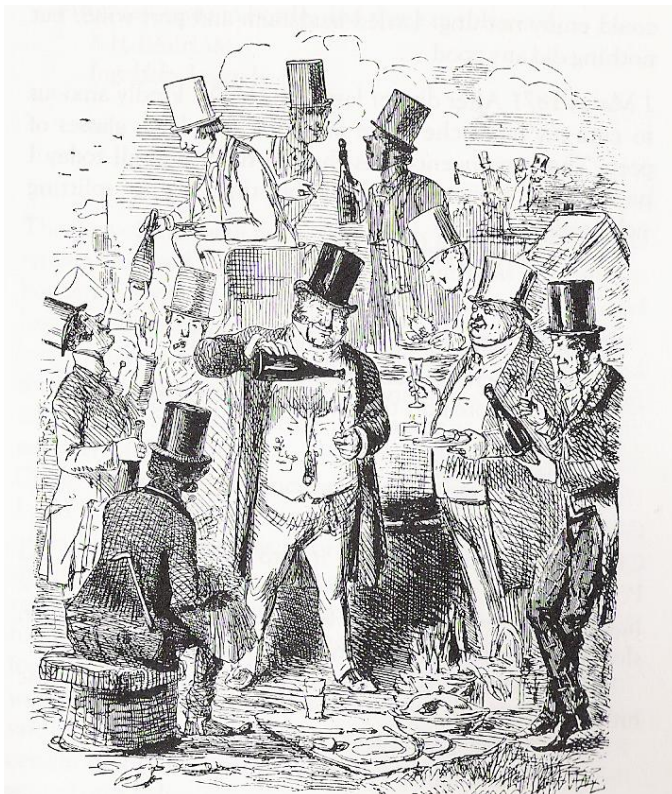
