The Parish of Sonning

The ancient parish of Sonning, originally extending from Sonning Common to Sandhurst was one of the great blocks of land handed over to the Church in the 7th century. In 909 A.D. Sonning with Ramsbury, became a separate bishopric, the Bishop of Ramsbury/ Sonning maintaining a riverside Hall in the village. In 1075 the see was transferred to Old Sarum, ultimately Salisbury, whose bishops had their own Palace on the same site as the Saxon Hall until 1574, when the manor was transferred to the Crown.

St Andrew's Church in the heart of the village was founded in Saxon times - probably by Birinus, first bishop of Dorchester-on-Thames. It was largely rebuilt in 1852, during the incumbency of Canon Hugh Pearson; it was he who founded the Sonning Parish Magazine in 1869.

The White Hart Hotel, now known as The Great House, and partly 17th century, stands on the site of older buildings including the home of 'Elias the Ferryman' mentioned in a deed of 1100. The French Horn Hotel, in Sonning Eye, was built in the 1880s in front of the original old inn - now Bridge House - and its farm buildings. The Bull Inn, belonging to the Church, was originally known as Church House, a guesthouse for pilgrims to medieval St Sarik's Chapel in St Andrew's. Also adjoining the church is Deanery Garden one of Sir Edwin Lutyen's best-known country houses built at the turn of the century, just above the site of the ancient residence of the Deans of Salisbury who regularly visited Sonning, the parish being a 'Dean's Peculiar'.

Sonning Mill produced a regular supply of flour from Saxon time until 1969, after which it was converted into a 'Dinner Theatre', the first of its kind in Britain. The Pearson Hall is the principal venue for village functions

Within the village boundaries lie the Reading Blue Coat School at Holme Park (once the home of the Lord of the Manor) Sonning Church of England Primary School, King George's Field and other sports grounds, and Reading University Farm - all of which help to preserve the rural atmosphere of Sonning, the centre of which is now a conservation area.

The civil parish of Charvil is of relatively recent origin but the land on which it lies has long been part of the ecclesiastical parish of Sonning. In the 18th and 19th centuries it consisted of Charville Farm and a few cottages, which lay between the villages of Sonning and Twyford and adjacent to the London to Bath highway.

The development of Charvil began between the two World Wars, particularly after the new A4 road was constructed in the 1920s bypassing Twyford, and was accelerated after 1945. To meet the needs of this increasingly large community, St Patrick's dual-purpose Church and Hall was consecrated and opened in 1952; it remains within the ecclesiastical parish of Sonning. It was considerably extended and refurbished in 2001.

The Vicar's Letter

Dear friends,

Firstly, a very happy New Year and decade to you all.

There is a large depiction of Christ on the west window of my last church in Broadstairs, and, if you look closely it appears that he is wearing lipstick. I highlighted this in a sermon once, not because I felt it was intended to be some new twist in the Da Vinci Code saga, rather an attempt to illustrate something that has long confused me, and been a source of some irritation. The issue is this. Why is it that so often when Christ is depicted, he appears with a rather limp expression on his face, with pristine chiffon robes, beautifully shining hair and with a rather camp demeanour? Indeed, the model of Jesus in that church's Easter garden appeared to have a touch of the Larry Grayson about him. It's all rather a puzzle when one stops to think of the Jesus we learn about in the gospels. A carpenter from very humble origins in a rural backwater, choosing rough fishermen as travelling

companions as they wandered from village to village in the dry and dusty heat of Israel. Indeed, I find that I am not alone in my frustration. Dorothy Sayers wrote in exasperation in her book *The Greatest Drama Ever Staged*: "We have very efficiently pared the claws of the Lion of Judah, certified him 'meek and mild,' and recommended him as a fitting household pet for pale curates and pious old ladies." This description of 'pale curates' also highlights the frequent comedic presentation of clergy on television as again rather limp-wristed and precious. Dad's Army and All Gas and Gaiters spring immediately to mind. So in churches up and down the land, Jesus comes across more often than not as a bit of a sissy, who wouldn't say boo to a goose, and our televisions tell us that many of his followers have followed suit. In an age obsessed with presentation and image, none of this does the church any favours.

One of the criticisms that is often levelled at the Bishops of the Church of England is that they don't speak out on moral issues of the day, and the inference, particularly from the media, is that they don't wish to rock the boat. This is sometimes unfair because Bishops do speak out, but the media often don't pay attention. It was therefore particularly heartening some time ago to see reported the Archbishop of Canterbury and his colleagues' contribution to the debate in the Lords on assisted dying. This bill had truly terrifying implications, and it was important for the church to speak up. There was also a vast petition signed by tens of thousands of Christians backing their stance.

When we speak out on controversial issues we expose ourselves to those who would disagree with our stance, and that isn't necessarily pleasant. We can be tempted to keep our thoughts to ourselves in the hope of a quiet life, and also not wanting to cause offence, and many Christians have done this over the related issue of abortion. I can imagine the Jesus Christ in that stained glass window would also steer well clear of the subject, opting for niceness over justice, politeness over truth. But as we well know, the real Jesus spoke out on all manner of issues, with no regard for the consequences, and I suspect he might just have had something to say about the termination of over 218,000 young lives, as happened in the United Kingdom last year. Sometimes it seems our leaders and indeed society as a whole are more concerned about eco light bulbs than the life of an unborn child.

Many people, of all faiths and none, question the fundamental principle of abortion, but equally, I perceive that there is a significant proportion of individuals who have never thought about the issue. At a time when so many couples are on adoption waiting lists, it is depressing to digest these figures. Indeed, Britain now has the highest rate in Europe of teenagers going for their second abortion. Surely, they were not all because of medical necessity?

The gift of life is God-given, and to be cherished. If nothing else it is surely time to reopen the debate on time limits. At present we can terminate a child's life up to 24 weeks into the pregnancy, and yet it has been proved that babies born prematurely at that stage, and slightly earlier, can and do survive. Seven hundred hours was spent in Parliament debating the issue of the extermination of foxes; where do our priorities lie?

Ann Widdecombe M.P. stood in the pulpit of my last church and memorably stated that the Church has been so busy bending over backwards accommodating everyone with different views and beliefs in our multicultural and rather irreligious society, that we have effectively surrendered our own faith. The implication is that the meek and mild, insipid and wholly ineffective Jesus, misguidedly depicted in so many of our Churches, has become our champion and guiding light. I know that it is something of a generalisation, but I wonder if she may just have a point?

Christingle: As Candlemas falls on the last Sunday in January, this will be our Christingle service. There will be no family service on the first Sunday in February.

Emmaus Nurture Course: Would you like to come and have a refresher in the Christian faith? Would you like to have the opportunity to ask questions and learn from other Christians in an informal atmosphere? The Emmaus nurture course has just been used successfully for our Confirmation preparation, and we shall be starting another course on January 13th at 11am. This will run every two weeks for 15 sessions. An evening group will also be started a little later in the New Year. Please let the Vicar know if you would like to come to the Wednesday group.

Serving: We have a dedicated group of servers who assist at communion services, but I would like to increase the number of those who are available. The commitment would be no more than once a month, and it is a really valuable contribution to our church. Anyone from the age of 9 onwards would be very welcome. There would be an informal training session or two, and the possibility of shadowing an experienced server if necessary. Please do speak to the Vicar or Jean Collin if interested.

Christmas Music: Thank you to David Duvall and the choir for providing us with such a wonderful variety of Christmas music. Once again we were blessed with their contributions. Also, we are most grateful to the flower team for making the church look lovely, to those who put up and decorated the tree, and to the manager of the Bull, Dennis Mason for donating it.

New Eucharistic Gold Vestments: The present gold chasuble (Eucharistic robe worn by the priest at communion) and burse and veil (coverings for the Chalice on the altar) have been in need of retirement for some years. They were threadbare and certainly not suitable for further use at our major festivals. We are therefore most grateful to the Friends of St. Andrew's for providing funding for a specially commissioned replacement chasuble and burse and veil which were first used at midnight mass. They have been made by Watts and Co. of Westminster and are of a Gothic revival design, and complement beautifully the magnificent setting in which they will be used. They are of the highest quality, and will be of use in the church for

many, many years to come. It is hoped that when funding allows, an altar frontal of the same design can be commissioned.


